Ash Wednesday A HOLY DAY OF INVITATION... an invitation from the Holy Spirit to enter 40 days of prayer, repentance, fasting and interior house cleaning. The Church knows that we tend to get lazy and lukewarm, and we become attached to the world. No matter what we have done in the past, today we can choose to change the course of our lives. With the words, "Remember you are dust, and to dust you shall return," we are reminded of our own mortality. May we all have a blessed Ash Wednesday and may this Lenten journey bring us closer to the One Who loves us beyond measure.

FEB. 22nd at 6 PM – MASS and DISTRIBUTION OF ASHES

"As you receive ashes, hear the one word that is spoken over you by God himself "MINE".

ABSTINENCE from eating meat is to be observed on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday, and ALL FRIDAYS OF LENT, by all those who are 14 years of age and older.

FASTING (one full meal) is to be observed on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday by all those 18 year of age and older, up to the beginning of their 60th year (i.e., the day after their 59th birthday.) Two smaller meals are permitted according to one's needs, but they should not together equal the one full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted. As always, those with medical conditions that demand otherwise are dispensed.

JOURNEYING THROUGH LENT

The journey through Lent to the celebration of Easter will hold a familiar rhythm. Each year, we enter these sacred weeks with a desire to let go of what is keeping us bound so that we can grow deeper in our faith and draw closer to Christ. This year is no different, and yet it has the potential to be quite different. It offers a new opportunity to encounter Christ, and to make His message of Good News more personal and real in our lives. As we journey towards the Passion of Jesus, we will hear Gospel stories of transformation – from thirst to fullness of life, from blindness to sight, from death to life. These are the transformations of the Christian life. As you begin your Lenten journey, may you walk faithfully beside Jesus, so that the Easter story can more authentically and personally become yours. May you be open to allowing the Holy Spirit to bring about transformation in your life, and may you receive the new sight and the new life that Jesus offers you.

Lent calls us to our inner room. To soften our hearts and listen for the voice of God...

DIOCESAN MEN'S CONFERENCE

An inspiring Catholic priest and a nationally recognized author will headline the 2023 Men's Conference, STRENGTH IN CHRIST – Be Not Afraid. The conference is scheduled for April 29th from 9:00 AM until 3:30 PM at Mount Aloysius College, Cresson. TALK AND REPLICA is COMING TO Holy Spirit Parish St. Agnes Church Sunday, March 26, 2023, at 3:00 PM. Don't miss this excellent opportunity to experience the Passion, Death and Resurrection of Jesus Christ in a way that can make this an unforgettable event in your life. Considered one of the greatest mysteries of our time, the Shroud of Turin continues to amaze and baffle scientists, doctors, historians, artists, and theologians. Scientists cannot explain the source of the image, which contains photographic

and 3-D properties on an ancient cloth. But is this the actual burial cloth of Jesus Christ? Bill Wingard, a speaker for the Shroud, will present the case for authenticity that has already been delivered on the east and west coasts, and you can be the judge. Come see a full-size replica of the Shroud and the photographic negative images that sparked an explosion of scientific interest and debate over a century ago which continues to this day. What message does the Shroud have for each of us? Bring others, including teens on up and your cameras.

PRAYERS TO MARY AND JOSEPH

We are taking requests to have a candle burning on the side altars under the Blessed Mother or Saint Joseph, our patron saint, in honor or in memory of your loved ones. We can take up to 3 requests for each altar, and we have many openings. The cost is \$10 for two weeks, call or stop in the parish office to reserve a date. *Also, don't forget our votive candles in front of the church. Please take a moment before or after Mass to light one of our blue and red votive candles for your own personal intentions.

STATIONS OF THE CROSS

One of the most powerful ways to enter into the Passion and death of Jesus is to pray the pious devotion we call the Stations of the Cross. The custom of walking and praying the Stations of the Cross was used in the fifteenth century. Pilgrims to the Holy Land developed a custom of visiting the places sanctified by Christ's early life, particularly the path he took on Good Friday from His trial at Pilate's house to Golgotha, where He was crucified and then on to the tomb of Joseph of Arimathea. Praying the Stations of the Cross is a powerful way to contemplate and enter into the mystery of Jesus' gift of Himself to us. In praying the stations of the Cross, we come to experience the love Jesus has for us as His faithful followers and for each one of us individually as we draw ourselves closer to Him through developing a deeper love and appreciation for His gift of salvation for us all.



You can walk that pilgrimage of Jesus' final journey as He carried His cross to Golgotha, the place of His crucifixion every Friday evening at 6:00 during Lent in the Church.

Today's readings reflect on our communal identity as disciples. Before we begin Lent together in a few days, we take time to appreciate what God has done by giving us our family of faith. In Leviticus, God tells Moses to "speak to the whole Israelite community" and give them instructions for living in love. Moses passes along the message—to each and every believer—that God's people must strive together for holiness. Saint Paul echoes this message, insisting that we are indeed God's holy children. As temples of the Spirit, we belong to Christ and to one another. This mutual belonging is a blessing and a challenge. In Matthew's Gospel, Jesus sets a high bar for Christian community: his followers must love not only those who are easy to love, but also the people who upset us. Together, let us ask God to give us this kind of love.
