BLESSING OF COUPLES

Vatican Declaration Fiducia Supplicans "On the Pastoral Meaning of Blessings"

The recent statement from the Dicastery for the Doctrine of the Faith approved by Pope Francis has caused confusion and widespread concern among some of the faithful regarding the sacrament of marriage. For those who have not read the document here is a synopsis.

The declaration reaffirms "the traditional doctrine of the Church about marriage, not allowing any type of liturgical rite or blessing similar to a liturgical rite that can create confusion". The official definition to which the dicastery refers is that "marriage is a covenant between a man and a woman". Even the pope lacks the authority to change the substance of that doctrine.

Fiducia Supplicans, however, leaves it up to the priest whether he will for pastoral reasons give a simple blessing to a couple approaching him for a blessing regardless of their circumstances while "avoiding all serious forms of scandal and confusion among the faithful". It would apply to situations such as an engaged couple who might be living together or a couple invalidly married who are seeking to have their marriage convalidated in the Church and who wish in private to receive a special grace to aid them in living a holy life and avoiding sin as they go through the process preparing for the sacrament of marriage. This is in keeping with the traditional theological understanding of blessings.

Unfortunately, the declaration may be misused by some priests and bishops as a justification for them to go beyond a legitimate interpretation of the document and actually conduct an illicit and invalid formal marital ritual which in the eyes of the faithful would seem to elevate to the level of a sacrament an illicit and possibly sinful union. Be assured that in most dioceses and parishes this will not happen. Please, pray for the pope, bishops, and priests of the Church that we may be faithful to the task entrusted to us by our Lord, Jesus Christ and, as the dicastery requests, avoid causing "scandal and confusion among the faithful". Pray also for all God's people, especially those struggling in troubled relationships that we may all respond to God's gift of grace, deal appropriately with our human weaknesses, and be found pleasing in the eyes of God.

This weekend's certainly easier than last. Yes, a Sunday—the Feast of the Holy Family and a holiday—New Year's Eve and Day—come crashing together again. But, it's easier because in the United States usually when a holy day of obligation falls on a Saturday or Monday, the obligation to participate in Mass is taken away. (Christmas, for what I hope are obvious reasons, is one of the exceptions.)

But, let's think about January 1. It carries levels and levels of meaning. The original feast in ancient Rome was in honor of Mary as the Mother of God. Vatican II revived that emphasis. For many centuries, it was the feast of the Circumcision—the rite that made Jesus part of the Jewish people. In some Christians it was the feast of the Holy Name also reflecting the gospel of the day. And, of course, in modern times it becomes the beginning of the civil year—with all our best hopes and promises to do better this time. In even more modern times, Pope St Paul VI named it the World Day of Prayer for Peace.

What can do with this multifaceted day this year? You don't have to come to Mass; but what better way to begin afresh than with God's sacramental grace and blessing? (And if you don't, please don't confess it—you can't sin against a rule that just isn't there!) Especially in the light of war, terrorism and violence, shouldn't we do something for peace? Offer a prayer? Read something about the struggles of folks in Israel or the Ukraine? Be informed about our world and its needs. Reconcile with someone we're not on good terms with? Do something for the poor? Make resolutions that are deeper than personal fitness, resolutions that heal and forgive and bring at least peace to our lives?
