40 days jesus stays in the descri, keeping a rast. What does it mean to fast? How would we explain this to someone outside the faith? We've often had to explain those ashes on our foreheads to someone else at school or the workplace. People have often wondered why we skip the meat we'd like to opt for fish on a Friday night. Sometimes we compare a fast to a diet. But there's a difference. Dieting is pretty much about us—

our health, our self-image, and the way we'd like others to see us. But fasting tells us to give up something to make us hunger for God. Remember St Augustine's words: "You have made us for yourself and our hearts are restless until they rest in you." Pay attention to our fasting this Lent. Make sure skipping the chocolate, caffeine, or bourbon doesn't just make us want those things more come Easter! Make sure our hunger and thirst push us to the One who is the Bread of Life and Cup of Salvation.

CRS RICE BOWL

We invite each family to take a RICE BOWL We make the most impact when we act together. Catholic Relief Services-CRS Rice Bowl is our combined parishes action together during Lent. Take a Rice Bowl from the back of the church or at the parish office if you still need to do so. Each day at your dinner table, pray the prayers found inside the Rice Bowl and together as a family,



place a monetary donation in your Rice Bowl. When each family does this during Lent, it brings us together as a community with a common purpose in place, to support families in more than 100 countries, helping them get access to enough nutritious food not only to survive but to thrive. The Passover Seger

This day shall be for you a memorial day, and you shall keep it as a feast to the LORD; throughout your generations, as a statute forever, you shall keep it as a feast. Exodus 12:14

The Passover Seder memorializes the passover of the Angel of Death and the Israelites' flight from Egypt. It was instituted by Moses under the Old Covenant.

On his last night of his time on earth, Jesus gathered his disciples to celebrate the Passover Seder. He uses the history and symbols of the Passover story to explain how his death is going to change the world. And he took bread and when he had given thanks, he broke it and gave it to them, saying "This is my body, which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me." And likewise the cup after they had eaten, saying, "This cup that is poured out for you is the New Covenant in my blood." Luke 22:19-20.

The New Covenant is the promise that God makes to mankind that He will forgive sin and restore communion with those whose hearts believe in His Son, Jesus Christ. Jesus' death on the cross is the basis of the promise.

"For God so loved the world, that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life." John 3:16

WHO WE ARE AND WHOSE WE ARE

The Lenten season is a fresh invitation to explore again who God is, who we are, and what it means to be human. We begin by hearing the tragic story of the first humans in the book of Genesis. As Paul describes in Romans, our struggles started when our ancestors broke the bond of unity with God, sought self-sufficiency, and grew apart from their true purpose and identity. In Matthew's Gospel, we see how Jesus resists the lure of living outside of unity with God. Jesus rejects false promises of possessions, power, and status. Instead, he puts his life in his Father's hands. As our model for living as a fully human person, Jesus demonstrates that we are created to live in relationship with and trust in God, and in harmony with and for all of creation.
