

A MESSAGE FROM FR. BRIAN - CELEBRATE THE COURAGE OF

THE SAINTS - ST. MARIA GORETTI FEAST DAY JULY 6TH

Courage, faithfulness, humility, love and mercy are certainly attributes that the saints have following the example of Our Lord Jesus Christ. There are countless saints whom I have always had a great love for as a priest. When someone asks me who are some of my favorite saints, one may think as a priest, I would say John Vianney, Padre Pio, John Paul II, and that would certainly be the case. However, every time I have been asked that



certainly be the case. However, every time I have been asked that question, I answer St. Maria Goretti, the martyr who died for her profound love for Our Lord Jesus. A few months before her 12th birthday she died a martyr's death by fighting off her attacker Alesandro Serenelli. She showed tremendous courage and love for Our Lord, and even as she breathed her last breath on earth, she lovingly forgave Alesandro and stated that she wants him to be with her in Heaven one day. After spending years in prison, Maria appeared to Alesandro and gave him 14 flowers of pardon to show God's mercy to him. What is so special about this encounter is it was a spiritual conversion for him who, after being released from prison, would in person go to visit Maria's mother Assunta and ask her for forgiveness to which she also forgave. Shortly after, the two of them would attend Holy Mass together and receive Holy Communion. I have always loved St. Maria's story of courage, love, and mercy that she showed so wonderfully. Also, to hear of Alesandro's conversion story is so powerful for all people who want to repent of their sinfulness and turn back to Almighty God. St. Maria Goretti is a patron saint of the youth, as well as a 40 year old priest from Holy Name. It is my hope and prayer that this great saint continues to intercede for all of God's people that we too may emulate the love and mercy of Jesus Christ.

IUU I TI & KELIGIUUS EDUCATION: DEFUKE TUU COME TU MASS

Before arriving at Mass each week, help your children get ready to meet Jesus in the Most Blessed Sacrament. You can do that in a few simple ways.

First, dress up for Mass.

Dressing up for an event shows how important that event is to us. Children dress up for their First Communion. People dress up for weddings, Baptisms and other important happenings in the life of their family. Why not teach your children to give God the best that they have? Wearing nice casual or dressier clothes is not something that God expects of us, but rather a way in which we can show our love for God. Our physical appearance demonstrates to our children that gathering at God's altar to worship Him and receive Him in the Eucharist is important to us.

Second, make it a point to observe the Eucharistic fast.

According to the Code of Canon Law of the Church, Catholics are required to abstain for one hour from all food and drink, with the exception of water or medicine, prior to receiving Holy Communion. Exceptions to following this are the elderly and the sick. Note that fasting is required for one hour before the actual reception of Communion, not one hour before the start of Mass, which really isn't so difficult to follow. So why fast at all? As we fast, our attention is drawn to what we are about to do—receive the Real Presence of Jesus in Holy Communion. The Eucharistic fast is in place to help us appreciate what we are receiving in the Blessed Sacrament and to help us hunger for Jesus, the Bread of Life. Observe this fast together to show your children that nothing we eat or drink could be more important than receiving Jesus as our food in the Eucharist.

GOSPEL MEDITATION: June 25, 2023 12th Sunday in Ordinary Time

When I was in middle school, there were times I didn't want my fellow students to see my parents drop me off or pick me up in the school parking lot. I was embarrassed of my parents. Why? I have no idea. Maybe it was our station wagon. Or I didn't want to look like a little kid. But in retrospect that was a silly thing to do. I was a kid. And I had two parents who loved me and had built a wonderful family. I was afraid of the other kids' judgment. How silly! I should have been afraid of forgetting or downplaying my family, which is where my identity had its deep roots.

This is a way to understand Jesus' words to his disciples this Sunday, when he says, "Don't be afraid of those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul; rather, be afraid of the one who can destroy both soul and body in Gehenna." Fear, in this sense, refers to where we find our deepest identity and our highest love. That's why Jesus says next that when we acknowledge him before others, he will acknowledge us before the Father. It doesn't mean we're brash or boastful. But rather we unhesitatingly and humbly embrace our identity as followers of Jesus and children of God the Father. After all, if we love who we are and where we come from, who cares what the other kids think about us?

The Necklace

I have a necklace that originally belonged to my greatgrandmother. I don't really know much about the man who gave it to her, most of those details have been lost to time. But I know that he wanted to marry her, and that she refused, and it had something to do with religion — ultimately, he did not share her faith. And while I've certainly seen many interfaith couples have loving and successful marriages, in this particular case, my great-grandmother discerned that this would not be one of those marriages.

Like I said, I don't have many details about this man, but I know that she felt she couldn't marry him because it might jeopardize the souls of her children, and therefore the souls of their children, and their children after them — me. She turned him down because of me.

My great-grandmother never sold that necklace, not even when the Great Depression further reduced her financial circumstances. She kept it, and she gave it to her daughter, who gave it to her daughter, who gave it to me. The necklace is always given with a warning: there is something worse than being poor, worse than being scared, worse even than being desperate. Worse than all of these things is separation from God.

When I wear this necklace, I think about my grandmother and this man she possibly loved a hundred years ago. I think of the many decisions we make every day — large and small, good and bad — that reverberate down through the generations in ways we cannot, at the time, imagine. I think of the God who knows every hair on my head.
