LEWIETERY REGULATIONS

It has been suggested that we publish the regulations governing our cemeteries to avoid misunderstandings. This is the first part:

In the very earliest days, Mother Church found it necessary to make rules and regulations which would protect the sacred places and the relics laid therein. She could not and would not allow anything

within the holy precincts which would desecrate them, lessen their beauty, or bring dishonor on the dead. To ensure the sacred character of parish cemeteries in the Diocese of Altoona-Johnstown, each cemetery is governed by the Pastor relying on the Cemetery's Rules and Regulations, the Canon Law of the Roman Catholic Church, and applicable Directives issued by the Bishop of the Diocese. Copies of both the Rules and Regulations and the Diocesan Directives are available for review in the Parish Office. Except where stipulated below, the Diocesan Rules and Regulations apply in all things pertaining to the operation of our cemeteries.

Ours is a Catholic Cemetery operated for the interment of those entitled to Christian burial according to the guidelines of the Roman Catholic Church. When one purchases a Burial Privilege Certificate, he or she and heirs bind themselves to the governing principles mentioned above currently in effect, or as amended in the future. Violation of these principles may result in the forfeiture of one's privilege to use the burial plot.

Saint Patrick's Day Dispensation

The Most Rev. Mark L. Bartchak is granting a dispensation from the obligation of Catholics in the diocese to abstain from meat on Friday, March 17, 2023, the Feast of Saint Patrick. Bishop Bartchak requests that any Catholic in the Diocese of Altoona-Johnstown who chooses to accept this dispensation should perform some other act of penance in its place. The choice of such penance is to be determined by the individual. The Bishop recommends that the penance reflect the spirit of Lent, that is, acts of prayer or charity to the poor. Catholics who choose to observe the traditional Lenten abstinence from meat on that day are not required to perform any other penitential acts.

The Seder Elements

In preparation for the Passover celebration, a special plate known as a "Seder plate" is prepared and placed on the table. This plate holds symbolic items that help us remember why Passover is so important.

The roasted lamb shank bone (Zeroa in Hebrew). The shank bone represents the Passover lamb that was the special sacrifice on the eve of the exodus from Egypt.

Morro – Bitter herb, usually horseradish – reminds us of the bitterness of the slavery that the Israelites endured in Egypt.

Charoses – A sweet, chopped mixture of nuts, fruit and wine. This symbolizes the mortar that the Israelites used to build the store houses for Pharaoh.

Parsley – A spring vegetable that reminds us of the renewal of spring.

Salted Water – Represents the tears the Israelites shed when they were slaves in Egypt.

Matzo – the unleavened bread the Israelites baked before leaving Egypt.

ARE YOU THIRSTY?

Do you feel unsettled or sense that life is about more than the daily details that fill your time, energy, and attention? Are you anxious or worried and yearn for peace? Is there an ache in your heart that longs for relief? The thirst for meaning, purpose, peace, and solace is real. We humans have a tendency to seek relief from such thirst with wealth, material things, or social status, failing to recognize that these things are fleeting. We may distract ourselves with constant activity, keeping ourselves busy and preoccupied rather than allowing ourselves to acknowledge the yearning in our hearts. We fail to see that only Christ can quench our thirst.

It was likely hot in the midday sun on the day that Jesus encountered the woman at the well. Scholars tell us that she must have been shunned by the other women in the community, leading her to avoid the cooler early morning time when others filled their jugs. Add to this that Jews and Samaritans shared longstanding animosity toward one another. No wonder she was surprised and perplexed when Jesus asked for a drink. Yet she did not run away. Jesus sought her out and she opened her heart and mind to his offer of salvation. Jesus seeks us out, too. Our Lord desires that we open our hearts and minds to the fullness of love, forgiveness, mercy, and peace that is only found in God. For what do you thirst at this time? Compassion, justice, consolation? Only Christ can truly quench your thirst. Jesus desires to do so. Open your heart today; "hope does not disappoint, because the love of God has been poured out into our hearts through the Holy Spirit who has been given to us" (Romans 5:5).
