

THE POWER OF HOLY WATER

Holy water has its great power and efficacy from prayers of the Church, which its Divine Founder always accepts. These prayers ascend to heaven each time you take holy water and sprinkle a drop either for yourself or for another. Listed here are the four main spiritual aids of this sacramental: Remits Venial Sins: Because holy water is one of the Church's sacramentals, it remits venial sin. Keep your soul pure in God's sight by making the Sign of the Cross carefully while saying, "By this holy water and by your Precious Blood wash away all my sins, O Lord." **Dispels the Devil**: The devil hates holy water because of its power over him. He cannot remain long in a place or near a person that is often sprinkled with this blessed water. Bless those at a distance: Holy water, sprinkled with faith and piety, can move the Sacred Heart of Jesus to bless your loved ones and protect them from all harm of soul and body. When worry and fear take possession of your heart, hasten to your holy water font, and give your loved ones the benefit of the Church's prayers. Assist the Holy Souls in Purgatory: Only in Purgatory can one understand how ardently a poor soul longs for holy water. If we desire to assist them in their preparation for Heaven by our prayers and good works, let us not forget them at the holy water font. The poor souls nearest to Heaven may need the sprinkling of only one drop to assist them in their final purification.



In the Acts of the Apostles, Paul and Barnabas demonstrate their instinct to worship with their faith community each Sabbath, dutifully taking their seats in the synagogue. In the Gospel, Jesus calls us his sheep and reminds us why coming together as a flock is so important: uniting in community, we imitate the unity of God.
