
# **REMEMBRANCE SERVICE**

"We do not want you to be unaware, brothers, about those who have fallen asleep, so that you may not grieve like the rest, who have no hope." – 1 Thessalonians 4:13.

During my 18 years in priesthood, a unique encounter with a family stands out vividly. While discussing an upcoming funeral, a family member emphatically warned me, "I better not hear you talk about hope in your sermon!" The shock of this directive left me grappling with how to respond in that moment. Without the chance for clarification, my mind filled the void with speculation, and even after years of reflection, the true meaning remains puzzling.

Upon contemplation, it seems unlikely that this individual lacked hope or wished to deprive others of it. Rather, it hints at a potentially misguided or poorly formed theology—one influenced, perhaps, by teachings such as "once saved, always saved" or "faith alone." These well-intentioned but problematic doctrines can be unwise, akin to the cautionary tale of the five unwise virgins in the recent Gospel.

Our hope, as articulated by St. Paul, is grounded in the wisdom of vigilance. The unwise virgins relied solely on their lamps, adopting a mindset of "I'm saved, so I don't need hope or any other virtue." In contrast, the wise virgins chose preparedness, guided by the practice of virtues, especially prudence. They illuminated their faith, hope, and love with the ongoing supply of oil—a wisdom that cannot be easily shared like a commodity.

Understanding this encounter as a clash of theological perspectives sheds light on the importance of embracing a holistic, virtue-driven approach to faith—one that transcends simplistic doctrines and fosters a rich, enduring illumination of hope.

# **THE OCTOBER COUNT**

Last month, our parishes along with parishes around the country conducted the "October count," a measure of attendance at Sunday Mass. The measure has been taken for many centuries, and in some European dioceses it is possible to measure the level of engagement in worship by the population over the course of many centuries. The October count has proven especially critical in the life of our Church as bishops use the figures to measure the vitality of parish life, to sketch parish boundaries, and even to decide when to close, merge, or form new parishes.
